Cantique de Jean Racine, Op. 11 was composed by Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924) at the age of 19 and won him first prize when he graduated from the Niedermeyer School. The original French text is a paraphrase by Jean Racine (1639-1699) of a matins hymn. The English version of the text heard this morning is by Harold Heiberg, who for many years taught at the University of North Texas.

Jean-Joseph Mouret (1682-1738) was a leading composer in France during the Baroque era. He mainly wrote for the opera stage, but his instrumental compositions are noteworthy. The Fanfare-Rondeau heard this morning is from Mouret's first of two Suites de symphonies and was composed in 1729. It is best known to modern audiences as the theme from

Masterpiece Theatre on PBS.


