The Confession of Belhar was adopted by the Dutch Reformed Mission Church in South Africa in 1986, during the time of Apartheid. It is named for the city in South Africa in which it was originally adopted and is a powerful statement that calls the church to unity, reconciliation, and justice in a time and place where racial separation made it impossible for brothers and sisters in Christ to worship together. The Confession of Belhar calls the church to faithful action, trusting in the reconciling work of Jesus Christ and the unity won for all of us through him.

Gerald Near (b. 1942) is a graduate of the University of Michigan; he has held various church positions and is currently a freelance composer and music publisher. *O Maker of* the World is attributed to Pope St. Gregory the Great (540-604). TIME OF PREPARATION

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ON THIS DATE IN HISTORY: The American ship Ranger carried the newly adopted banner of the Stars and Stripes to a foreign port for the first time as it arrived in France (1778); photographer Matthew Brady took the first photograph of a president when he took President James Polk's photo in New York (1848); actor and comedian Jack Benny was born (1894); Congress approved and President McKinley signed legislation allowing states to use voting machines for federal elections (1899); the League of Women Voters was founded in Chicago (1920); and First Lady Jacqueline Kennedy conducted a televised tour of the White House (1962).

The Reformation brought about a renewed interest in, and appreciation for, the singing of psalms, which played an important role in the formation of Reformed Christians. Early in the 20th century there was a resurgence in metrical Psalmody with the publication of a Psalter by the American Presbyterians in 1912. Metrical Psalmody is when the psalm text is set to music very similar to a hymn tune. By mid-20th century the tradition of singing psalms had once again waned, when Psalms were included in worship more as responsive readings than as sung settings. The tradition of singing the psalms in the Presbyterian Church was once again revived with the publication of a new Presbyterian Psalter in 1993.

The offertory anthem is a setting of Wondrous Love by Alice Parker (b. 1925) and Robert Shaw (1916-1999). Shaw and Parker paired up many times to produce arrangements of folksongs, hymns and spirituals that have become standards in the choral repertoire. The final verse utilizes the compositional device of augmentation. In this case it means that the tenors are moving twice as slow as the sopranos/ altos and the basses are moving twice as slow as the tenors.

The Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (USA) consists of two books: The Book of Order and The Book of Confessions. Any changes to The Book of Confessions must be approved by a majority of the General Assembly and then approved by 2/3 of all presbyteries. If the necessary votes are received, the amendment to The Book of Confessions is then enacted by the next General Assembly.

PC(USA) sent to the
presbyteries a proposed
amendment to the
Presbyterian Church
(USA)'s Book of
Confessions that would
add the Confession of
Behlar. The amendment
was approved and the
Confession of Belhar is
the newest confession
adopted by the church.


