INVITATION TO THE OBSERVANCE OF LENTEN DISCIPLINE

The Rev. Schoenewolf

Friends in Christ, every year at the time of the Christian Passover we celebrate our redemption through the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Lent is a time to prepare for this celebration and to renew our life in the paschal mystery. We begin this holy season by acknowledging our need for repentance, and for the mercy and forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel of Jesus Christ. We also begin our journey to Easter with the sign of ashes. This ancient sign speaks of the frailty and uncertainty of human life, and marks the penitence of this community. I invite you, therefore, in the name of Christ, to observe a holy Lent by self-examination and penitence, by prayer and fasting, by works of love, and by reading and meditating on the Word of God.

IMPOSITION OF THE ASHES

After coming forward for the imposition of ashes, you are invited to visit either or both of two prayer stations located in the front of the Chapel.

Station One: "Letting Go" – At this station, you are invited to identify and prayerfully surrender the things in your life of which you must let go in order to draw nearer to God. You are invited to light a candle as a symbol of giving up that which hinders you from closeness with God.

Station Two: "Taking On" – At this station, you are invited to identify and prayerfully affirm the things in your life that you would like to take on in order to draw closer to God – whether prayer practices, acts of service, Sabbath, etc. You are invited to select a small stone to carry with you on your Lenten journey as a symbol of taking on something that will enable you to draw closer to God.




SPECIAL PRESENTATION FOLLOWING SERVICE


