Henry "Harry" Thacker Burleigh (1866-1949) was born in Erie, PA and was baritone soloist at St.

George's Church in New York City for 52 years. He said this of his motivation for setting spirituals:

". . . In Negro spirituals my race has pure gold, and they should be taken as the Negro's contribution to artistic possessions. In them we show a spiritual security as old as the ages. . . . These songs always denote a personal relationship. It is 'my Saviour,' 'my sorrow,' 'my kingdom.' The personal note is ever present. America's only original and distinctive style of music is destined to be appreciated more and more."

Then the Lord said, "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and



WHAT DO YOU BELIEVE?

The Confessions show us the importance of stating our individual or collective beliefs in a certain time and place. As you begin your Lenten Journey, spend time in reflection and prayer. Ask yourself:

- The Confession of Belhar in one phrase uses the passive verb "stand by." How might you actively "stand by people in any form of suffering and need?"
- Injustice is described as "growing roots in our land." This is a vivid, organic image that names the way that small seeds of injustice put down roots and can grow into dangerous weeds and large plants of unrighteousness. Think about ways we can be better "gardeners" of God's creation, mindful of the wide range of dangerous, small growths of injustice affecting our natural and social worlds.
