Johann Sebastian Bach's

(1685-1750) well-known arrangement of Sleepers, Wake! is from the Schübler Chorales, a set of six chorale preludes written a few years before his death. It is an arrangement of the tenor aria in his Cantata 140. The chorale it is based on is found at #349 in Glory to God.

The text for the hymn O Lord, How Shall I Meet You dates back to the early years of the Protestant Reformation (1653). It was composed by Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676), who was a pastor and composer of over 100 hymns. This tune is also used for the hymn All Glory, Laud, and Honor.

It is likely that some sects persisted during the early years of the Christian church – groups that traced their identity back to John the Baptist. About 17,000 of one such group called the Mandeans continues even today in modern Iran and Iraq. The Jewish historian Josephus described John as "a good man who commanded the Jews to practice virtue by exercising justice towards one another and piety towards God, and to come together in baptism."

France and educated in
Paris. He authored over
100 hymns, including our
middle hymn this
morning, *On Jordan's*Bank the Baptist's Cry.
Due to his opposition to a
papal bull of Pope
Clement XI, Coffin was
denied last rites and a
Christian burial.
