On This Date in History: Pope Leo III crowns Charles the Great (Charlemagne) Roman Emperor (800); St. Francis of Assisi assembles the first Nativity scene in Greccio, Italy (1223); the beloved Christmas carol (Silent Night, Holy Night - Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht) was sung in Austria (1818); Louisiana and Arkansas are the first states to observe Christmas as a holiday (1831); Montgomery Ward introduces Rudolph the 9th reindeer (1939); To Kill a Mockingbird, a film adaptation of the novel by Harper Lee, directed by Robert Mulligan and starring Gregory Peck, is released (1962); and it was the first successful trial run of the system which would become the World Wide Web (1990).


