The translation of Psalm 86 was published in 1963 by the Ladies of the Grail, an ecumenical community first started in 1921 by a Dutch Jesuit priest. The community has grown to include women from all continents, and describes themselves as "an ecumenical movement, open to the ways of other religious traditions and to expressions of genuine spiritual search which are consistent with its identity and integrity of purpose."

The unnamed Samaritan woman at the well is one of at least 20 women who play significant roles in the gospels but are never named, such as the woman with an issue of blood, Herodias' daughter, the Syro-Phoenician woman, and Pilate's wife.




