The time to purchase a new health insurance plan for 2018 is here. Open enrollment begins Nov 1 and runs through Dec 15, 2017. You only have six (6) weeks to enroll in order to have coverage on Jan 1, 2018. You MUST renew the plan you have or select and enroll in a new plan by Dec 15, 2017. Open enrollment isn't just for people who don't have health insurance. Every year those who pay for their own health insurance must shop for a new plan, or re-enroll in their existing plan. It is important for individuals to realize they have a choice, and shopping for new health insurance can save money.
