The use of the term sonata does not refer to the classical sonata form, but rather as it had been used by Bach, as a suite of varying pieces.

Mendelssohn's six sonatas, his opus 65, were published in 1845.

Brian Wren composed the text for the hymn Bring Many Names to highlight that God is with us at all stages of life, that God is revealed through both genders and through the range of experiences we navigate as we grow older. Wren is the emeritus Professor of Worship from Columbia Theological Seminary (Presbyterian) in Decatur, GA.

Adam lay ybounden is a 15th century text relating to the events surrounding Adam's fall in Genesis. It opens with Adam in bondage for 4,000 years from his death through the crucifixion of Christ. It then tells how, if it were not for Adam eating the apple, there would have been no need for redemption through Jesus Christ being born of Mary, the *heavenly* queen. But, since he did eat the apple, we must now sing of that blessed moment. Deo Gratias thanks be to God!


