Aaron Copland wrote Fanfare for the Common Man for the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra. It was premiered on March 12, 1943 and was written in response to the US entry into the Second World War. The title was inspired in part by a famous 1942 speech where vice president Henry A. Wallace proclaimed the dawning of the "Century of the Common Man." Over time it has become associated with events of national significance.

The Feast of Weeks or Pentecost was a spring harvest festival occurring 50 days after Passover. It is a day associated with the gift of the Law of Moses. For the Christian church, it has been honored as the day associated with the movement of the Holy Spirit and public proclamation of the gospel of Christ.

Carlton Young (b. 1929) is a teacher, editor, composer, and conductor who served as editor for two revisions of *The Methodist Hymnal* in 1966 and 1989. Henry H. Tweedy (1868-1953) was an ordained Congregationalist Minister and Professor of Homiletics at Yale Divinity School.

This day in history is the birthday of abolitionist Sarah Mapps Douglass (1806) and authors Leo Tolstoy (1828) and Richard Wright (1908); Pres. Dwight Eisenhower signed the first civil rights bill since Reconstruction (1957); the three largest Lutheran denominations in America combined to become the ELCA (1982); and Palestinian leaders and Israeli leaders agreed to recognize each other, clearing the way for a peace accord (1993).

Louis Vierne (1870-1937), the famed blind organist of Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, composed six symphonies for organ. The first symphony was composed in 1898-1899. Vierne referred to the final movement of this symphony as his own personal Marseillaise. (The Marseillaise is the national anthem of France.)
