Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy was commissioned to compose a set of voluntaries by the English publishers Coventry and Hollier. Mendelssohn composed several voluntaries and then decided to extend and organize them into a set of six sonatas. The use of the term sonata does not refer to the classical sonata form, but rather as it had been

used by
Bach, as a suite of
varying pieces.
Mendelssohn's six
sonatas, his opus 65,
were published in 1845.


