The author of the Trinitarian hymn *Come, Thou Almighty King* is unknown, but the hymn has been popular since the 18th century. It uses a range of biblical metaphors, describing God as helper, Ancient of Days, Comforter, Spirit of Holiness, and eternal One in Three.

The doctrine of the Trinity arose as a reaction against various early church heresies, a response to a few scripture references, and an attempt to capture the unified action of God made known through works of creation, redemption, and ongoing sanctification. In art, the Trinity is represented by images of God in heaven above the crucified Christ with a descending Dove (Spirit) between them.

TIME OF PREPARATION

"[When considering the Trinity], each of the three persons shares fully in all activities of the others, e.g., in creation, redemption, and sanctification. St. Augustine's favorite analogy for the Triune God was one self-consciousness with three distinctions of intellect, will, and the bond between them."

While the first hymn today used several male language/metaphors for God, the hymn text for Mothering God, You Gave Me Birth comes from the medieval mystic Julian of Norwich. It too uses several metaphors for God, including birthing Creator, source of food, life, and love, patient Spirit, harvest-yielding Soil.

The text of I Bind Unto Myself Today is set to two different tunes, St. Patrick's Breastplate and Deirdre. The first is named for an Irish saint, Patrick, a fifth century missionary and bishop in Ireland. The second is named for a heroine in Irish legend, Deirdre. The tune Deirdre is only heard in the fifth verse of the hymn, sung a cappella by the choir.

Marin Marais (1656-1728) was a French Baroque composer and viol player. He studied composition with Jean-Baptiste Lully.




