Andraé Edward Crouch was born in San Francisco on July 1, 1942 and raised in Los Angeles. At the age of 11 he began playing the piano at the rural church where his father served as pastor. He wrote his first gospel song at the age of 14. He died on January 8, 2015. In addition to his solo career and multiple awards and honors, his arrangements were heard prominently in films such as The Color Purple (for which he received an Oscar

nomination) and The

Lion King.

Harry T. Burleigh (1866-1949) was born in Erie, PA and was a wellknown singer. At the National Conservatory in New York City, he studied with, and probably taught spirituals to, Antonin Dvorák. Burleigh was one of the most prolific arrangers of spirituals in the first half of the 20th century. My Lord, What a Morning looks ahead to the "end times"—not with apprehension, but with a sense of longing for an

end to worldly suffering.


