On this Day in History: Henry VIII was recognized as supreme head of Church in England by the Convocation of Canterbury (1531); the Gnadenhutten Massacre - Ohio militia kill 90 Indians (1782); Susan B. Anthony addressed the U.S. House Judiciary Committee arguing for an amendment to the U.S. Constitution granting women the right to vote, 16 years after legislators first introduced a federal women's suffrage amendment (1884); Phyllis M. Daley was the first black nurse sworn in as U.S. Navy ensign (1945); the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in McCollum v. Board of Education that religious instruction in public schools is unconstitutional (1948);

Malcolm X resigned from the Nation of Islam

(1964); and Malaysia Airlines Flight MH370

with 239 people lost contact and disappeared,

prompting the most expensive search effort in history and one of the

most enduring aviation mysteries (2014).

The well-known setting of God So Loved the World is from John Stainer's (1840-1901) oratorio The Crucifixion. As a boy, Stainer was a chorister at St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and was organist of the cathedral later in his life before retiring due to poor eyesight.

THOSE WHO DIED ON THIS DAY: Wentworth Cheswell, American auditor, teacher, Revolutionary War messenger, 1st African American elected to public office, died of typhus fever at 70 (1817); Edward John Dent, British clockmaker to Queen Victoria and commissioned to make Big Ben, London (completed after his death by his son Frederick Dent), died at 62 (1853): Millard Fillmore, 13th President of the United States (Whig: 1850-53), died at 74 (1874); Henry Ward Beecher, American clergyman (1813 1887); and Billy Eckstine, American jazz singer (Tenderly, A Fool in Love), died at 78 of a stroke (1993).



As we gather at ELPC to worship and for other activities, we want to follow the best practices to prevent the spread of illness. Please feel free to wave during the passing of the peace instead of shaking hands especially if you are not feeling well. There is currently no vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). The best way to prevent the spread of respiratory diseases is to follow preventative actions including:
