### ON THIS DAY IN HISTORY:

Sister St Stanislas Hachard, the first American nun, took her vows in New Orleans (1729); Maine was admitted as the 23rd state of the Union (1820); Finland was the first European country to give women the right to vote (1907); NAACP began a coordinated attack on segregation and discrimination (1933); the first American blood bank in a hospital was opened at Cook County Hospital in Chicago (1937); South Africa withdrew from the British Commonwealth (1961); and race riots erupted in the Watts section of Los Angeles (1966).

This refrain from a longer hymn could well be understood as a black gospel reflection on several biblical passages: 2 Corinthians 5:7, 1 Samuel 7:12, and 1 Chronicles 17:16. All these texts bear witness to God's faithfulness toward all who are engaged in the pilgrimage of faith.

The Nazi appropriation of this tune for propaganda purposes has clouded a noble piece of music first associated with this text in 1889. In a 1779 collection, the author indicated that this hymn is primarily based on Isaiah 33:20-21 with allusions to several other passages.

As we gather at ELPC to worship and for other activities, we want to follow the best practices to prevent the spread of illness. Electricity contributes global warming gases when coal and natural gas are used to produce it. However, as of Jan 1, 2020, ELPC's electricity is offset by equivalent generation of renewable energy (wind), with 30% of it produced locally. This milestone will be celebrated next Sunday, March 22 after the 11 am service. There will be an opportunity to switch to renewable electricity for your home; it will help if you have your electric bill accessible. Doing so can offset about half of your home's carbon footprint which is 11 tons or 24,200 lb annually in PA. Let's lighten the burden on the environment together!
