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## Pastoral Message

*The Rev. Dr. Randall K. Bush, Pastor*



On Easter Sunday, our Book of Common Worship offers this prayer of adoration:

*Glory to you, O God: you have won victory over death, raising Jesus from the grave and giving us eternal life. Glory to you, O Christ: for us and for our salvation you overcame death and opened the gate to everlasting life. Glory to you, O Holy Spirit: you lead us into the truth. Glory to you, O Blessed Trinity, now and forever. Amen.*

On Easter and for several weeks thereafter, we re-tell the story of Christ's resurrection. We sing hymns about the victory of life over death, hope over despair. The Lenten refrains of "Lord in your mercy" are replaced with joyful "Alleluias." And even if we cannot fill the pews on Easter morning, we have memories of organ, brass, and robed choir members grandly processing down the center aisle to "Jesus Christ is Risen Today."

But must the words of Easter be restricted to our church worship services? On the Monday after Easter, what conversations might emerge if we mention to someone on the street about Jesus' resurrection from the grave giving all of us lasting hope? Can you imagine sharing with a friend how the Easter season is a comforting reminder that God's Holy Spirit leads us (individually, nationally, globally) into all truth? If we're honest, using Easter language outside the church walls can be tricky. Many people of faith, and people who question faith, have sincere doubts about the bodily resurrection of Jesus. Strangers and acquaintances we might meet may well wonder how we are defining truth (even "Holy Spirit led truth") in this persistent season of divisions and distrust.

Easter talk outside church walls is definitely challenging, unless you remember one key concept. Jesus wasn't resurrected from the dead to make one day special. The victory over sin, death and despair wasn't won so that a special anniversary can be added to the worship calendars of churches the world over. And ultimately, the point of Christianity is not to focus attention on ourselves as believers in distinction to everyone else outside our church walls. No, Easter opens our eyes to how every day is special. Christ's victory has much less to do with us and much more to do with everyone else. Easter doesn't tell us much about religion; it tells us about everything else in the world.

The language of faith isn't designed to just talk about a few "religious" things. It is meant to talk about everything that exists—life, death, community, justice, suffering, fear, hope, love. Easter reminds us that every time we try to contain "faith language" to church settings, Christ bursts forth from our liturgical tombs and sanctified sepulchers and shines resurrection light onto the streets and communities in which we live. Every time we feel hesitant to talk about holy resurrections, Christ shakes us and directs our conversations to the countless mundane-yet-miraculous resurrections happening every day: returning citizens starting over after prison, former addicts finding healing, souls and bodies abused in relationships discovering safety and healing love, national policies shifting away from racism and inequity to fresh commitments to serve the common good. So boldly offer the Easter prayer of adoration on Easter Sunday and every day of the year!

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## April Environmental Tip



Now—before air conditioning season begins—is the perfect time to switch to an all-renewable source for your electricity. Rates tend to be lowest in early spring, so take this opportunity to lock in a good price for the next 12 months. Electricity supplied by distribution companies (like Duquesne Light) is produced with a hefty contribution from burning fossil fuels (natural gas, coal), which releases greenhouse gases and contributes to climate change.

Multiple companies offer plans that let you choose renewable sources. And switching is easy at [PAPowerSwitch.com](http://PAPowerSwitch.com)! Once you decide on a supplier, they will contact your utility company and initiate the change. Here are some tips:

- Look for 12-month, fixed-price contracts instead of variable-price rates
- Mark your calendar to renew your contract at a favorable rate in a year

This alarming video on how China is controlling the Muslim Uyghur community is a *PBS FRONTLINE* special undercover report, filmed in China’s secretive Xinjiang region. The video investigates the Communist regime’s mass imprisonment of Muslims, and its use and testing of sophisticated surveillance technology against the Uyghur community.

### April 18: The Church in Iraq | Stories of Faith & Faithfulness

Meet your Presbyterian family in Iraq and learn about the congregations in Basrah, Baghdad, and Kirkuk, who continue in their ministry and mission despite the enormous challenges in their troubled land. We also will learn of an initiative to rebuild the church in Mosul, destroyed by ISIS, but which has the distinction of being one of the first Protestant churches established in the Middle East.

Our speaker Marilyn Borst has traveled extensively to Iraq since 1998, and was most recently there in 2019. She is the associate director of The Outreach Foundation, an independent Presbyterian mission agency, which was founded over 40 years ago to help connect congregations to God’s work around the world.

Climate change and urbanization are global issues. ELPC took a big step a few years back in creating our rain gardens. But how might our own neighborhood or yard make a difference? “Developing a profound sense of oneself in relationship to natural and social ecosystems is necessary grounding for the difficult work of environmental advocacy.” Through hands-on activities, we will discuss and learn how to construct our ecological identity: using the direct experience of nature as a framework for our personal decisions, professional choices, political action, and spiritual inquiry. Many of us are seeing this time of COVID-19 dormancy from Taizé as an opportunity to reemerge with a new sense of imagination and creativity regarding how we lead our Taizé gatherings. Hopefully you participated in one of our pilot relaunch gatherings in March.

### Virtual Lenten Retreat

Over February 19–20, about 30 of us spent 24 hours in solitude, reflection, and prayer in community with one another. We gathered around the Lenten theme of Jesus' 40 days in the desert, considering our belovedness, our own interior landscape, and what the Lenten desert is sifting and sorting in each of us. Here are reflections from two participants and some photos of Lenten altars that were created.



*When you go into wild places, it's always good to go with a trusted guide and good companions. It's far more likely that you'll find what you've come for—even if you aren't sure, starting out, exactly what that is. And that's how it was for me, being led in my meditation by readings, prayerful activity and conversation with others.*

*As one of our readings suggested, the journey took me into "this place of starkness where I come to know the wildness within me." That's where I sat, getting better acquainted with those parts of myself, being visited by my personal temptations. And I learned that, in spite of those little devils, I was, indeed, beloved and surrounded by beloved others.*

*I thank Pastor BJ—our guide—and I thank my fellow travelers for helping me get to this clearer vision.*
