



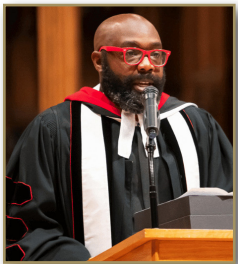

What an awesome role we all play. We get to take care of this congregation; these ministries: children and families, worship, Christian Education, mission, the Happy Wanderers, the LGBTQ ministry, choirs, staff, and so much more. We get to take care of this magnificent building: its mechanics, the beautiful tower, the rain garden, meeting rooms, the kitchen, and worship spaces.

We reflect on the past 18 months when ELPC staff and volunteers creatively provided uninterrupted ministry in worship, outreach, Christian Education, building safety, and pastoral care. At the same time, congregational giving was steady and strong. We rejoice in God's faithfulness.



This year's Stewardship theme is *Follow as God Leads*. As we look ahead with faith to be led where God leads us in 2022, we're setting a goal of \$760,000 in pledges, a 4% increase over last year. Pastoral Message

The Rev. Dr. Randall K. Bush, Pastor



Every so often I read a sentence that stops me in my tracks. Here is the opening line from a book review:

In the deep sea, it is always night and it is always snowing.

The first half of that sentence made perfect sense. In the depths of ocean, we are beyond the reach of sunlight and so it must always be night. But snowing? Surely the author isn't suggesting that particles of ice and snowflakes are floating in the water at the bottom of the ocean. So I read further:

A shower of so-called marine snow—made up of pale flecks of dead flesh, plants, sand, soot, and dust—sifts down from the world above...Many deep-sea creatures eat snow, or they eat the snow eaters.

"Marine snow" is such a vibrant image. It takes something familiar from my experiences here on land (snow) and transports that image into a place beyond my experience yet still just as alive and real (the ocean floor). Before reading that sentence, I'd pictured the ocean depths as dark and sterile; after reading the sentence, that place was changed forever into something active, mysterious-yet-graceful.

The language and rituals of faith ideally have that same impact on us. We walk through the world, processing what we see through the lens of human mortality, flesh and blood. But then a phrase hits us and opens up an entirely new reality:

Now we see in a mirror dimly; then we will see face to face...

I am with you always, even to the end of the age...

[God's] power is at work within us, able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine...

Suddenly what we see is not all there is to see. This realm of touch, sight and sound is not all there is. There is a larger reality of spirit, of grace, of loving intentionality, of eternity. Our entry into that world is the gospel of Jesus Christ. And even if the full mystery of that gospel is beyond our minds to comprehend, it changes our lives forever by accepting that such a gospel exists—and exists for us.

The month of November has mundane doorways that invite us to walk through them and glimpse the life-changing, ever-near spiritual side of life. It may be what it feels like to carry a bag of groceries into church on Stewardship Sunday so that someone else may not be hungry. It may be putting together an Advent wreath of candles and imagining time from the perspective of the Christ who was, who is, and who is to come again. These are "thin places" in which eternity draws near and captures our spiritual imaginations once more.

The book review ended by noting that the marine snow and luminous wonders of the deep are mostly hidden from our view. *As soon as you stop thinking about it, the deep can so easily vanish out of mind.* The same can be said of faith and of God's spirit that surrounds us each day. This day, take time to think about the wonder that is the spiritual door opened for us in Christ Jesus.

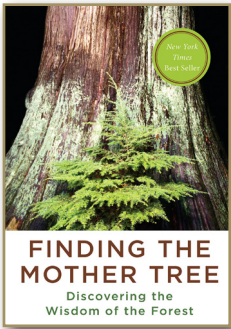
Sun., Nov. 14: Telling the Truth with Dr. George Yancy 12:30 pm

Truth telling is a basic moral value. We interpret it to be the communication of what is known to be believed with no deceit or falseness. How then, do we factor in unintentional or intentional self-deceit, bias, and prejudice? How do we account for long-held false narratives that we are exposed to everyday in private and public agendas that suppress the “whole truth and nothing but the truth?”



Following Sanctuary worship on **Sun., Nov. 14**, the Facing Systemic Racism Committee is honored to have Dr. George Yancy help us consider these questions. Our discussion will consider the courage, vulnerability, painful listening, dangers of truth telling, and the importance of trust and love in teaching truth. Participants may view the presentation in the Social Hall or via Zoom at 12:30 pm.

Dr. Yancy is professor of philosophy at Emory University and is a distinguished scholar at Dartmouth College. He is a revered author and speaker on racism in America and the impact of white backlash in conversations about race.

Mission Money Makes a Difference in Haiti

For the past 47 years, ELPC has partnered with the Medical Benevolence Foundation (MBF) to support their medical mission around the world.



When Haiti experienced the devastation of a 7.2 magnitude earthquake in August, MBF responded almost immediately. In September, the ELPC Mission Board responded to the call to fund medical care for the people of Haiti by donating \$10,000. ELPC's donation helped to support

medical personnel from the Hospital St. Croix, which dispatched mobile teams to areas that were all but unreachable to care for Haitians living in remote areas.

This is but one example of ELPC mission dollars in action, making a difference throughout the world. For additional information, visit MedicalMission.org.

Session Actions

At the September Session meeting, much time was spent deliberating on the recommendations from the Stonewall Jackson Window taskforce. This group of dedicated members presented their findings during an after-church event on Sun., Sept. 12, and a follow-up conversation with the Session elders on Tues., Sept. 14. You may view church-wide presentation at tiny.cc/elpcstonewalljackson.

During the September Session meeting, three motions were robustly discussed—one substantive, one logistical, and one reparative—and all three passed by an overwhelming majority vote.

- The first calls for the removal of the representation of Stonewall Jackson from the East Transept window in the Sanctuary, replacing that section with a single-color panel of glass, and installing an educational wall plaque below the window to offer commentary on this change.
- The second motion directs the Property Committee to get estimates from stained glass window companies regarding the design, cost, and work timetable.
- The third motion extends the taskforce's work by asking them to make a recommendation on “outward-facing” reparations—committing financial resources to the community in amounts meeting or exceeding whatever must be spent on our church's “inward-looking” architectural and educational changes.

Updates on this process will be heard at the October Session meeting, and will likely remain on the Session agenda for the coming months. We will keep you informed as progress is made on this important effort to live into our Matthew 25 commitment to eradicate systemic racism.

Nov. 7: A Chaplain Discusses Her Ministry to Seniors

As a chaplain at Fair Oak Senior Living, Rev. Ing Kalchthaler has the holy honor of walking alongside people from ages 70–101. As one might expect, these members of God's beloved family are nearing the end of their earthly journey. Their questions and concerns are both unique and universal: death and dying, the resurrection, loss of many things, but also great gains. Rev. Ing will share her experiences and the ways in which Christ is present in the faces of the residents and their families.

Nov. 14: A Pittsburgh Company Countering Online Human Trafficking

Cara Jones, an ELPC member and a co-founder of Marinus Analytics, will be with us to discuss internet related safety concerns and recent advances in policing to dismantle systemic trafficking.

Marinus Analytics is a Carnegie Mellon University spinoff company dedicated to building technology-driven tools for the public safety and human services sectors to help identify and combat under-reported crimes, empower a victim-centered response, and prevent exploitation of the vulnerable. The company's flagship service, Traffic Jam, monitors online adult service websites for indicators and patterns of human trafficking. The service earned third place in the 2021 IBM Watson AI XPRIZE competition—a global competition incentivizing the use of artificial intelligence for radical breakthroughs in problems facing humanity.

The Ethics in Context of Paul Tillich (three-week series)

During the next 3 weeks, ELPC Elder Ron Stone will present his new book, *The Ethics of Paul Tillich*, by discussing ethical theory and practical morality in these contexts:

Nov. 21: The End of Empire and European Socialism

The collapse of Germany in 1918 led to radical life styles, revolution, and—for Tillich—religious socialism, which could not overcome Nazism. Christian ethics were obscured, and revolution provided the context for the overthrow of traditional ethics.

Nov. 28: World War II and the Bomb

We will examine Tillich's critique of Hitler and white racism, encouraging the U.S. in the war after his exile, and how ethics were developed in response to the bomb.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Training

As part of our ongoing work to eradicate systemic racism and provide resources for church leadership and staff related to this important goal, our ELPC program staff and Personnel Committee—as well as a few members of our Facing Systemic Racism Committee—met in late September for a daylong training in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI). The session was led by two skilled consultants from the EnterChange Group, and focused on building safer workspaces through greater sensitivity to issues related to DEI. Some of the topics covered included intersectionality, equality vs. equity, macro and microaggressions, and positive techniques to counter aggressions or offer affirmations.

Additional training is being explored as we continue to work on living into our Matthew 25 goals both inside and outside our church walls.
