Time of Preparation

The Rev. Dr. Martin L. King, Jr., renewer of society, martyr, pastor, and arbiter of non-violent resistance, is remembered as an American prophet of justice among races and nations., a Christian whose faith undergirded his advocacy of vigorous yet non-violent action for racial equality. He pastored churches in Montgomery, AL, and Atlanta, GA; his witness was taken to the streets in other places, such as Birmingham, AL, where he was arrested and jailed while protesting against segregation. He preached nonviolence and demanded that love be returned for hate. Awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, he was killed by an assassin on April 4, 1968. Annually, a civil national holiday and commemorations are celebrated on or near the day of Dr. King's birth, January 15.

We Shall Overcome is recognized as the unofficial anthem of the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s. It was popular with folk singers, including Pete Seeger. Joan Baez led a crowd of 300,000 in singing *We* Shall Overcome at the Lincoln Memorial in August 1963. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. recited the words to the hymn in Memphis on Sunday, March 31, 1968 during his final sermon before being assassinated the

following week.

ON THIS DATE IN HISTORY: The groundbreaking novel, Miguel de

Cervantes' El ingenioso hidalgo Don Quixote de la Mancha, better known as Don Quixote, was published (1605); the Crittenden Compromise, the last chance to keep North and South united, died in the U.S. Senate (1861); the 18th Amendment prohibiting the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating beverages was ratified by the requisite number of States (1919); The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was born (Jan 15, 1929); General Marcelite Jordan Harris, the United

States Air Force's first
African American female
general was born in
Houston, TX (1943); and
Robert C. Weaver
became the first Black
presidential cabinet
member when sworn in
as Secretary of Housing
and Urban Affairs under
the Johnson
Administration
(Jan 18, 1966).



A Letter from the Birmingham Jail:

Remembrance and Reflection — Jan 30 (first of a 3-part series) On April 16, 1963, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., wrote, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." That statement is still true today and proves to be a relevant topic for these times.

During the Church School hour on Sunday, Jan 30, the Rev. Dr. Randy Bush, the Facing Systemic Racism Committee and the Faith Formation Board invite all adults and students in grade 6 and up to participate in a discussion of the Rev. Dr. King's prophetic letter.

For this first installment of the series, Dr. Bush, who has done substantive research on the letter as part of his dissertation, will serve as the principal presenter.


