On this Day in History: Elizabeth Blackwell was the first woman to receive a medical degree in the U.S. (1849); the first successful insulin injection was given to a diabetes patient (1922); Walter Morrison sold his rights to his flying disc (Frisbee) to Wham-O (1957); and the following people died: Edvard Munch (1944), Salvador Dali (1989), Paul Robeson (1976), and Johnny Carson

(2005).

This same incident is described in Mark 6:1-6; however, Luke moves it up to the beginning of Jesus' ministry. Scrolls of the Hebrew scriptures were kept in a special place in the synagogue and handed to readers by the "chazzan" or attendant of the synagogue. On this day Jesus read a Messianic text from the prophet Isaiah.
