## JANUARY 30, 2022 — 11 AM SANCTUARY WORSHIP FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy was commissioned to compose a set of voluntaries by the English publishers Coventry and Hollier. Mendelssohn composed several voluntaries and then decided to extend them and organize them into a set of six sonatas. The use of the term *sonata* does not refer to the classical sonata form, but rather as it had been used by Bach, as a suite of varying pieces. **Mendelssohn’s six** sonatas, his opus 65, were published in 1845.


