These younger members of the household of faith are not just the future of the church—they ARE the church.

## **Pastoral Message**

The Rev. Patrice Fowler-Searcy, Associate Pastor for Mission Ministries



Where Have I Seen the Holy Spirit at Work? Like the followers of Jesus, who were hiding on the day of Pentecost, I have seen the Holy Spirit at work and show up at times and in places that I least expected or anticipated. I have witnessed the Holy Spirit show up in sick rooms, when a doctor pronounced that a tumor was no longer present or a patient would fully recover. I have seen the Holy Spirit show up in places of grief, comforting and assuring a family that lost a loved one. I have witnessed the Holy Spirit move in desolate places, assuring people that all was not lost. And I have

witnessed the Holy Spirit show up in my own life when situations were beyond my control and God's grace was more than sufficient to guide, keep, open doors and hearts, and make ways out of no ways.

In this season at ELPC, many of us may think or feel that the Holy Spirit has left the building after almost three years of being separated by COVID and mask wearing; the continuation of hybrid meetings and virtual worship. Some of you may feel that the Holy Spirit has abandoned the building as Pastor Randy has been called to a sister church to provide pastoral leadership. However, beloved, the Prophet Isaiah reminds us that "God is about to do a new thing: now it springs forth..." On the day of Pentecost, the followers of Christ were cowering in fear, they felt abandoned, threatened, and powerless. They could not imagine, think, or sense the new thing that God was about to do, and just like that, God's new thing showed up!

I am so thankful that God does not leave us alone and the Holy Spirit shows up in people, places, and times where and when we least expect. The Holy Spirit shows up every day with the rising and setting of the sun; the Holy Spirit shows up in the laughter and smiles of young and old alike; the Holy Spirit shows up as we accompany people who have come to our city from war torn and dangerous countries, when we walk with a single parent preparing for homeownership or to further their education. The Holy Spirit shows up in soup kitchens, shelters, clothing banks, and at furniture and food collection sites. And the Holy Spirit is in places of worship, both grand and small.

I look forward to witnessing and participating in how the Holy Spirit shows up, moves, leads, and blesses our individuals and collective lives in this season of Pentecost and transition. And I imagine that by God's grace, we will all be in awe, come to know one another in new and diverse ways, and be transformed and empowered to **be** God's disciples in our church and the world. "God is about to do a new thing: now it springs forth..."

## **Pastoral Message**

Where have I seen the Holy Spirit at Work? I don't usually experience the Holy Spirit with the same fierce, shocking power as the disciples did on Pentecost. For me, I tend to experience the Holy Spirit in a surprising insight, a moment of truth, or the ability to stretch beyond my perceived capacity and be able to love well. I experience the Holy Spirit when I recognize that I am able to forgive a painful grudge away, pray according to another's need, or feel a courageous calm in the midst of a difficult situation.

This past year, I have felt the Holy Spirit kiss my cheek, when my five-year-old son kissed my tears away, reminding me (as we taught him), that love never dies. I have felt the Holy Spirit strengthen me when personal exhaustion and the needs of others ran deep. I have felt the Holy Spirit accompany me so that I could accompany those I love through the fear and grief and hope that is a part of death.

I notice the Holy Spirit (I think the Holy Spirit is ALWAYS with us—but that sometimes we tune the Spirit out!) when I am surprised by grace in any form changing a moment: from confusion to clarity; from discord to peace; from despair to hope.

In the next chapter of our shared ministry together, I give thanks that ELPC is a community through which I continually encounter the Holy Spirit: Through your prayers, questions, and enacted desire to do justice; through your MANY gifts and willingness to share those gifts; through your humor, wisdom and broad welcome... I praise God for the work of the Holy Spirit through you and upon you, and look forward to seeing how we experience the Holy Spirit in this next season together



## An 11-Year Journey From Izalco to Pittsburgh



Gabriela "Gaby" Reyes first came through the doors of ELPC in fall 2018, when she heard that Casa San José and ELPC were offering afternoon ESL (English second language) classes. She could see the ELPC steeple from her apartment building in East Liberty, and Gaby and her sister Elizabeth were able to take a long lunch break from their cleaning jobs to attend the classes.

Neither of them had been able to attend much school in El Salvador, and they loved the learning environment that ELPC

member Linda Harrington and other teachers provided. On the one hand, learning English felt like an insurmountable goal, and on the other hand, seemingly insurmountable goals had not stopped the sisters before.

In 2010, their oldest sister had left her children with the sisters and grandparents to find work in the U.S. with the goal of getting them out of the daily violence and corruption that had taken over their town, Izalco. She applied for asylum and came to Pittsburgh where they had a distant family member. A year later, she was able to send money for Gaby and Elizabeth to come and bring her two children. Even though they hated to leave their grandparents and their home that looked up towards Izalco Volcano—known as the Lighthouse of Central America—life was increasingly dangerous, and the economic situation was tenuous.

Their journey took eight months. They boarded buses, trains (yes, the famous La Bestia), cars, and trucks, as well as walked. They crossed the border and were taken to a detention center, while Immigration determined whether or not they could await their asylum case in Pittsburgh. After four months of waiting in detention, they travelled to Pittsburgh to reunite with their sister. They quickly found work cleaning. And soon thereafter, Gaby married a man from her hometown who also was in Pittsburgh.



Five years later, Gaby was granted a green card (permanent residence)—and five years after that, she was allowed to apply for U.S. citizenship, which required her to pass an English test and the U.S. citizenship exam. Casa San José set her up with ELPC member John Benedict to help her prepare. She passed, and on April 29, Gaby—along with 35 others—were sworn in and granted U.S. citizenship.

Gaby's journey took 11 years and more than \$15,000 in immigration legal fees. Her next goal and dream is to buy a

house and see her grandparents. Now her sons point to the ELPC steeple and know that is where their mom studied to become a U.S. citizen. She shares her story to encourage others that they too can become citizens.

Thank you to ELPC who has hosted ESL classes since 2018, and provides volunteer teachers, tutors, and childcare. New classes will start in September and volunteers are always needed.
