


- Hold a prayer stone, palm cross or prayer beads.

The Word and Meditation: Matthew 2 (selected verses)

but in the filthy stable, hallowed ground,



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


Prayer over the Anointing Oil (in unison)






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CLM13 Sing A New Song To The Lord, All You Peoples
