

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Pastoral Message

I love questions. Questions open us up, cause us to search and look deeper or wider than perhaps we would normally turn our gaze. They turn up the soil, they expand our horizons, and they open portals into new dimensions. Questions invite power sharing, honor the individual and are provocative and disarming. **Quest**ions send us on a **quest**. Jesus knew the transformative power of questions and utilized their incisive edges quite often. In fact, I've been told he asked at least, 325 questions, 236 of them were unique. "What do you want me to do for you?"

"What do you think?" "Who do you say that I am?" "Do you love me?" "Do you want to made well?" Which one of Jesus' questions is your favorite?

What questions are you asking in this season of your own life? What questions are you asking in this season of the life of East Liberty Presbyterian Church? How would you categorize the season of life that we are in? What do you long to see happen? What are you grieving, hoping for, and working towards? What part are you playing in helping live into the questions we are asking? How do you want to use your gifts, talents, and passions to envision and build the next chapter of ELPC?

Doubts are also a form of questions. Perhaps this is why I love Thomas? While Thomas never asked a direct question, he was present to his doubts, grief, wonderings, and curiosities, all implicit questions. Perhaps he wondered: why Jesus left them or how God could have let Jesus' death happen at all, or how it was possible that Jesus was physically alive or if the others were lying, among a myriad of other questions. Regardless, he stayed present to his doubts and questions in the context of his community. He kept seeking and asking. What about you? What doubts do you have? What do you need to "touch and see" so that God can help your unbelief about our current season?

Perhaps one of my all-time favorite quotes comes from the Ranier Marie Rilke, where he is offering advice to a young poet.

"Be patient toward all that is unsolved in your heart and try to love the questions themselves like locked rooms and like books that are written in a very foreign tongue. Do not seek the answers, which cannot be given you because you would not be able to live them. And the point is to live everything. Live the questions now. Perhaps you will then gradually, without noticing it, live along some distant day into the answer."

May God grant us the patience, creativity, and grace to live the questions of this season of our church and gradually live into their answers.

Once again, ELPC's Environmental Team of the Justice Committee and Tree Pittsburgh invite you to help us weed and mulch street trees on Penn Ave. in East Liberty on **Sat., June 3**, 9 am–12 pm. May 14: Call It Grace: Finding Meaning in a Fractured World

The Rev. Dr. Serene Jones is the first woman to be president of Union Theological Seminary in New York City. She occupies the Johnston Family Chair for Religion and Democracy. She is a past president of the American Academy of Religion, and was professor of Theology at the Divinity School at Yale University for 17 years.

In this video, she will discuss her latest book *Call It Grace:* Finding Meaning in a Fractured World.

May 21: Womanist Midrash (commentary):

A Reintroduction to Women of the Torah and of the Throne This video is by womanist biblical scholar, the Rev. Wilda Gafney, Ph.D. She is a professor of Hebrew Bible at Brite Divinity School in Fort Worth, Texas. She is the author of books, such as A Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church, Womanist Midrash: A Reintroduction to Women of the Torah and of the Throne, Daughters of Miriam: Women Prophets in Ancient Israel; and co-editor of The Peoples' Bible and The Peoples' Companion to the Bible. She is an Episcopal priest canonically resident in the Diocese of Pennsylvania, a former Army chaplain, and congregational pastor in the AME Zion Church.

May 28: Sacred Earth, Sacred Soul: Celtic Wisdom for Reawakening Our Souls (Part 1)

Dr. John Philip Newell is a Celtic teacher and author who calls the modern world to reawaken to the sacredness of Earth and every human being.

In this video, he discusses his latest book *Sacred Earth, Sacred Soul: Celtic Wisdom for Reawakening to What Our Souls Know and Healing the World.* He discusses "the "sacredness of the newborn" as preferable to the doctrine of original sin; how we "forget who we are, made of God;" and that "we need grace to restore us to the sacredness of our nature."

Participants in the High School summer mission trip must meet certain



Fridays in The Garden

On Good Friday, Jesus was buried in a garden. The first person to encounter the risen Christ was Mary Magdalene. At first, Mary thought Jesus was the gardener. What a beautiful mistake. But make no mistake, on Fri., May 12, 9 am—noon, the Environmental Team and Gardening Crew will meet for a workday in the Rain Garden. Join as you are able for a morning of weeding, mulching, and fellowship. The group plans to meet every second Friday, May—September.



The Rain Garden stretches along Penn and Whitfield Aves. and is a specially designed part of our church's landscape that collects the considerable runoff from our church's massive surface area and allows it to soak into the ground rather than flood the sewers and streets. The trees and shrubs were selected with care for this purpose. They also help to filter out the pollutants in runoff and provide habitat for songbirds and wildlife, especially important as green spaces have dwindled. ELPC received grant funding to install the rain garden, because of its benefits to the environment, but it's up to us to maintain it along with the rest of the church grounds.
