Welcome to Taizé

We hope this time and space of prayerful song and quiet meditation will give you rest in body, mind and spirit. We invite you to pray and meditate in a variety of ways as you are so inclined.

- Hold a prayer stone, palm cross or prayer beads.
- Allow the simple repeated refrains to be sung over you and join in as you are able.
- Come forward to the table to doodle or color a mandala.
- Sit on a prayer cushion or chair at the front to be closer to the icons and artwork.
- Light a candle in prayer for another.

May you awaken to the restful and restorative presence of the Spirit, and may you carry that awareness with you out into the world.

What is Juneteenth?

Juneteenth, a blend of the words June and nineteenth, is an American holiday commemorating the end of slavery in the United States.

Despite the *Emancipation Proclamation* issued by President Abraham Lincoln on September 22, 1862, freedom did not come to those still held in bondage in the resistant state of Texas until



Union Major General Gordon Granger rode into Galveston on June 19, 1865, with 2,000 federal troops. From the balcony of the Ashton Villa, the first mansion built on the island, Gordon announced, "The people are informed that in accordance with a proclamation from the executive of the United States, all slaves are free." With the announcement, the newly freed people flooded the streets in jubilant celebration. *Juneteenth*, known also as *Freedom Day*, was launched the following year.

Juneteenth embodies for many African-Americans what the July 4 holiday does for all Americans — liberation. It serves as a chronological turning point in the American drama about the triumph of the human spirit over the cruelty of slavery. Juneteenth is a time to pause and remember those African-Americans descendants who suffered and died, and to honor those who survived as living witnesses to the inhumane institution of slavery. It is a time to venerate the shining legacy of resistance and resilience of an abjectly oppressed people.

Juneteenth is annually celebrated in more than 200 cities in the United States. Although the observance typically takes place on June 19, in some cases the commemoration extends throughout the week or month.





The Word/Meditation: Exodus 6 and Luke 4 (selected verses)

I have heard the groaning of the Israelites whom the Egyptians have enslaved, and I have remembered my covenant... I am the Lord, and I will free you from the burdens of the Egyptians and deliver you from slavery to them. I will redeem you with an outstretched arm and with great acts of judgment. I will take you as my people, and I will be your God. You shall know that I am the Lord your God, who has freed you from the burdens of the Egyptians.

Jesus stood up and read from the scroll of the prophet Isaiah: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set free those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down.

Words from Saints and Ancestors

Indeed our survival and liberation depend upon our recognition of the truth when it is spoken and lived by the people. If we cannot recognize the truth, then it cannot liberate us from untruth. To know the truth is to appropriate it, for it is not mainly reflection and theory. Truth is divine action entering our lives and creating the human action of liberation.





* I Know The Lord's Laid His Hands On Me





Forest Bathing is more than just hiking, it is an immersive sensory experience that allows you to look at the forest differently than before. It combines concepts of meditation and mindfulness through a series of guided invitations to allow you to relax and enjoy the moment. The walk ends with wildcrafted tea and light snacks.

ELPC EVENTS

What is Juneteenth and Why is it important for ELPC to participate?

Juneteenth is the celebration of the announcement on June 19, 1865, of the release of all black people from slavery. Over two years after President Lincoln declared all enslaved persons were free, Major General Gordon Granger and the Union Army marched into Galveston to enforce the Emancipation Proclamation and free the last enslaved black Americans in Texas. This represents our second American Independence Day.

A week of celebration events will take place around Pittsburgh, and the Facing Systemic Racism and the Justice Committees are sponsoring ELPC's participation in the march on Saturday, June 17 from Freedom Corner at Crawford and Center Ave. to Point State Park. We encourage congregation members to join us at 10 am to March for Voting Rights. The church van will be available for those who would like to ride from ELPC to Freedom Corner or ride in the parade. If marching isn't your thing, you can cheer on the celebration, beginning at 11 am, by standing along Center Ave. across from PPG Paints Arena at Frankie Pace Park, an outdoor museum/historical monument to the Hill District. You can also join us at Point State Park for the music festival, information booths, items for sale and food vendors. Bring a blanket or folding chair.

We will also be hosting a *poster-making* event on Wednesday, June 14 before the 7 pm Taizé service (which will feature gospel music) and on Friday, June 16 from 6-7:30 pm in the Maker Space at ELPC. Voting rights will be the theme of the night. We encourage families to help make creative posters and learn more about *Juneteenth*. On Friday we will share pizza and salad.
