Born in Suffolk, England, the Rev. Dr. Lee is the product of a loving home where his mother and grandmother instilled in him the values of pride and integrity that are guiding him through his life and ministry. He exercises his gifts as an educator of leadership, worship, and theology.

Rev. Dr. Lee currently serves as the president of Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. He comes to the presidency after seven years of service at Wesley Theological Seminary as vice president

for Campus Administration and associate dean for Community Life. A dedicated theological educator, he believes strongly in education as the vehicle for expanding one's view of the world. He has served on the faculty of Northern Virginia Community College and is often a guest lecturer at workshops and seminars dealing with Christianity in the 21st century; religious difference; and issues affecting church leadership.

Rev. Dr. Lee is married to the Rev. Chenda Lee, an elder in Full Connection in the Virginia Annual Conference of United Methodist Church. Together they have four beautiful daughters, Akeemah (pronounced: Ah-key-ma), Jaanaiya (pronounced: Jah-nye-yah), Cydah (pronounced: Say-duh) and Camaini (pronounced: Kah-may-knee).

# **Pastoral Message**

The Rev. Heather Schoenewolf Acting Co-Pastor and Pastor for Educational Ministries



In a world where there is so little that is constant, I typically take scales of measurement for granted. A cup of milk is a cup of milk. 10 pounds of flour is the same amount of weight as 10 pounds of bricks. 100 degrees Fahrenheit is the same amount of heat when the thermometer registers that temperature. The only exception to this rule was one that I have long-recognized and accepted: the world of women's fashion, in which the numbers representing size can mean vastly different things across different clothing labels.

I was surprised to learn, then, that a mile has not always been a consistent form of measurement. That which I assume has ALWAYS denoted a length of 5,280 feet has a widely varied history across time and place and meaning. In ancient Rome, a mile indicated 1,000 double paces (one step with each foot); the medieval English mile was 6,610 feet; the old London mile was 5,000 feet. In the Middle Ages, throughout Germany, Holland, and Scandinavia a mile indicated an arbitrary measurement, ranging anywhere from 3.25–6 English miles in length. In other contexts, a mile simply meant "a great distance" and in others it meant not a length of distance but of time—measuring about 20 minutes. The 5,280-foot mile was not codified as a measurement until Elizabeth's reign, in which it was set by a legal act at 320 perches, the equivalent of 5,280 feet. How about that!

Ok, so what does all of this have to do with our life together at ELPC?

Since mid-April, our PNC has been spearheading our collective engagement in a data-collection process called the "Congregational Assessment Tool" or "CAT Scan." One survey was completed by the congregation and affiliates; another by our Session; another by our Staff. A tremendous amount of data was received—about worship, mission, community, education, satisfaction, energy, engagement... While there are statistical benchmarks against which ELPC's responses can be compared, many of the qualities being "measured" were qualitative—like involvement, energy, satisfaction. There is no one way to measure engagement, and not even one conclusion that can be drawn from the information.

Fortunately, ELPC has been working closely with an extraordinary consultant, Michelle Snyder, who has been clear to name: "Data is not discernment." As much as we might appreciate the ease of pushing a button and having a computer spit out the qualities of an ideal pastor for ELPC, the data is a tool for the next step of the process: Discernment. In small and large groups, the PNC, Session and Congregation as a whole will be asking of ourselves what these "measurements" mean. Who are we now? Who is God calling us to be? Where are we growing? Where are we being called to grow? What do we find challenging? How prepared are we to navigate that challenge?

I'll be honest, the task ahead may feel daunting—or simply like it is just taking too long. But the GOOD NEWS is that we worship a God whose faithful love for us cannot be contained. Scripture reminds us in Psalm 139 that the God who knows the number of hairs on each one of our heads is a God whose love reaches us wherever we may go. Psalm 103 reminds us that God's steadfast love is as high as the heavens are above the earth—what's more God's steadfast love is from everlasting to everlasting.

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### **News From Your PNC**

The Pastoral Nominating Committee along with ELPC Session, pastoral staff, and program staff spent June 10 with Michelle Snyder, the consultant ELPC contracted to assist in interpreting and understanding the data received from 301 people (yay for you!) via the CAT Scan (Congregational Assessment Tool). It was fascinating, revealing, and enlightening to begin to learn what many of you are thinking about where we are as a church presently, where we might consider heading to in the future, and what your thoughts are about new pastoral leadership.

In the coming days, ELPC's Session will prepare a summary of the CAT Scan results. The summary will be made available to our congregation to provide an interesting snapshot of the responses given. As always, if you have any questions, please feel free to speak with any member of the PNC or with Pastor BJ.

The PNC's next step will be to review the data we received and to determine where we need more information from you. Stay tuned to hear about the possibility of focus groups/listening sessions this summer, and consider your willingness to serve in this way. (These groups will be open to all in our congregation; completing the CAT isn't a pre-requisite for your participation in this important work.) It would be a huge help to the PNC to learn about your views on ELPC as we work our way toward writing the MIF (Ministry Information Form).

After completing the MIF in the fall, we will submit this job/church/congregation/activities description to the Presbytery for dissemination nationally for clergy in all 50 states to see who and what ELPC is and what we are looking for.

Additionally, Jim Eng, Sara Hackett, and Linda Lane talked with some of our youth on June 12 to hear their thoughts about our church. We are working as hard as we can to learn as much as possible from all active participants in the life of ELPC.

So there you have it! Please keep us in your prayers as we continue this important work for OUR church, and also feel free to speak with any of us individually. We feel honored to serve on the PNC and we are committed to doing the very best job we can so that ELPC can continue to move steadily forward in our community.

## Support the PW Diaper Drive

Clean diapers are a basic need of every infant and toddler. Yet, one in three families cannot afford enough diapers to keep their child clean, dry, and healthy. three in five parents miss work or school because they can't afford the diapers required to leave their baby in childcare.

The Western Pennsylvania Diaper Bank, wpadiaperbank.org, has been helping families meet diaper needs for more than a decade. The Diaper Bank began at New Light Temple Baptist Church, serving families in Allegheny County through six partner agencies. Last year, the Diaper Bank provided over two million diapers to families in Allegheny, Washington, and Westmoreland counties through 53 partner agencies.
