Happy Mission Month!

In October, we celebrate that the Mission Ministries of ELPC are central to our life of faith, and lift up some of the many ways in which we as a community respond to God's call.

Although my official title is "Associate Pastor for Educational Ministries," it is the "mission" of ELPC

that drew me in over 25 years ago. I was searching for a church home that would fully include my gifts for ministry as a woman, and one that lived out the love proclaimed in Scripture. And I found that here—a multi-racial church; a church that affirmed full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ persons—not just in word but in action; a church with dynamic worship services and programs inside the church—who was also present to the community outside it...

Unfortunately, the church across the ages has often engaged in practices that have brought about harm in the lives of others and labeled that effort "mission." In those instances the proclamation of the gospel in word and deed was not been invitational nor loving nor just. Instead, mission initiatives mirrored colonialism. People groups and individuals the world over were told that they must abandon their identities, customs, languages, traditions and beliefs in exchange for salvation. They were indoctrinated with a belief in Jesus Christ that prized a profession of faith at all costs—without realizing how the tactics uses to cultivate such a profession brought harm to God's beautifully diverse people.

But here at ELPC, we have held the belief that faith must be lived, that *ALL* are loved, that it is our duty to care not only for the people who live under our own roof, but for those who would be counted among the "least of these" in Matthew 25. At ELPC—25 years ago and now—I witnessed a community that prized diversity, that was willing to take risks to be just, that affirmed that we are all saved by grace through faith and that a proclamation of Gospel is about extending a radical welcome so that all will know Christ's love.

I invite you this mission month to think about how *YOU* might participate in Christ's Mission in the world. There are as many ways to respond to this call as there are people in the world. What are *YOUR* gifts? How can you engage in our shared mission and call?

Take some time this month to learn more about ELPC's Mission Ministries, to visit neighborhood ministry partners, attend a class after worship...but also strive to notice how we participate in Christ's Mission as we worship, attend Sunday School, and greet a stranger.

May they know we are Christians by our love!

Christianity, as we know it, is evolving. Dr. Newell discusses the yearnings that have led many of us to be dissatisfied with our Western Christianity inheritance.

Oct. 15 & 22; Nov. 5, 12, & 19: Meeting Jesus the Christ Again: A Conservative Progressive Faith

Pastor Emeritus Rev. Dr. Bob Chesnut was ELPC's senior pastor from 1988–2002. He was the founder of the Seekers class in 1994. In a five-week series, via Zoom, he will discuss his book *Meeting Jesus the Christ Again: A Conservative Progressive Faith*.

Christians have long been divided, but especially these days, over questions such as: Is Christianity basically about following Jesus or believing in his divinity and atoning death? Are we humans fundamentally creatures of original sin or original blessing? Is Jesus basically our teacher and guide or our Lord and Savior? Do only Christians get to heaven? Are Christians called only to individual morality or also to social justice? Dr. Chesnut's book helps us get to both/and rather than either/of thinking about these and other faith issues.



News From Your PNC

During August and into September, we held a series of Listening Sessions to gain in-depth insights from members of the congregation regarding what people are looking for in pastoral leadership. In September, we began to familiarize ourselves with the formal materials used by the Presbytery when a congregation is seeking a new pastor. Also in September, we were reviewing materials other similar congregations have used in their pastoral searches.

Our specific charge for the month of October is to work with the Presbytery to complete a Ministry Profile which will communicate externally what our congregation is looking for when we advertise the position externally. The Ministry Profile includes a section where we describe our congregation's vision for ministry and the community. This is why the feedback you provided in the survey and the Listening Sessions is so valuable. We are taking what we heard from the congregation to complete these sections of the profile. This way, when the profile of our congregation is posted nationally by the Presbytery, the pastoral candidates will be able to learn about who we are as a congregation and what we need most in the future.

Stay tuned as we continue to work this fall and keep our committee and our congregation in your prayers.

Use of Pronouns

The Justice Committee invites you to use your personal pronouns when introducing yourself to others. You may have noticed new name tags at Rally Day or the Extravaganza that included a space for you to add your pronouns. We also have pronoun stickers that you can add to your permanent ELPC name tag.

Pronouns are linguistic tools that we use to refer to people. Common pronouns include she/her/hers, he/him/his, and they/them/theirs. Nonbinary pronouns include she/them, he/them, and they/them. There are other nonbinary pronouns.

Pronouns are integral to who we are, and we share pronouns because we want to avoid assuming someone's pronouns based on factors like appearance. By sharing our own pronouns routinely, we encourage others to do the same and demonstrate that we understand the importance of sharing pronouns. Using someone's correct pronouns is an important way of affirming someone's identity and is a fundamental step in being an ally.
