But that task is so large I wouldn't know where to begin or end. So for now, here is a note to all of you:

Dear ELPC,

"Thank you" feels like an inadequate phrase to express the breadth of gratitude I feel **for** you and **toward** you for the ministry we have shared together over the last 27 years.

And honestly, we've shared more than a ministry. We've shared LIFE.

We've navigated heartache and conflict and a global pandemic. We've laughed and created and assisted those in need. We've celebrated weddings and births and adoptions and baptisms and graduations. We've grieved our loss as those we love have died, and we've reminded each other of the hope of the resurrection of Jesus Christ each time.

We've sung and worshiped and embraced and clapped and asked questions and prayed. We've shared meals...especially pizza. (We've had A LOT of pizza together.) We've been nourished by the loaf and cup prepared for us by Christ, and by the Communion we've shared in the body and blood of Jesus Christ.

We've climbed walls, square-danced, marched, processed, played hide-andseek, heard our voices echo as we've climbed the spiral stairs to the belltower. We've traveled for retreats and mission trips. We've solved problems and offered support when there was no solution to be found.

Thank you for the deep honor of sharing your lives with me in so many rich and beautiful ways. Thank you for sharing my life with me, for encouraging my gifts, for welcoming my family.

Most importantly, perhaps, is this:

Thank you for daring to witness to the radically hospitable love of God in Christ well before it was acceptable to do so. Thank you for showing this spiritual seeker what it meant to be a family of faith who is willing to live out the gospel in word and deed. Thank you for being a community of faith who truly embraced and welcomed and longed to be a haven for ALL of God's children—especially those who had heard otherwise.

Thank you for giving me hope that church, although not perfect, could be faithful, prophetic, and relevant—and for opening yourselves to me so that I could see that I too could be a part of a church that would welcome ME rather than restricting my forms of service. Thank you for helping me to identify God's call on my life and encouraging me to step out in faith.

Thank you for loving me, and thank you for letting me love you.

I will miss you individually and corporately as we each embark upon this next chapter of ministry and life. AND I continue to give thanks to God for you, being fully confident that the One who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.

ELPC Will Honor Linda Addlespurger



ELPC expresses deep appreciation to Linda Addlespurger, program director of Hope Academy of Music and the Arts, for her 22 years of diligent and creative leadership of this outreach program to children and youth of ELPC and the larger East Liberty community.

In 2002, Linda took the reins as Hope Academy's program director and proceeded to:

- Expand the offerings of private and group lessons in music, dance, and theatre
- Market the program to youth and families, allowing them opportunities to participate in the arts on a sliding-scale cost, based on family income
- Seek and cultivate relationships with both funding and arts organizations
- Hire gifted musicians to provide excellent instruction to hundreds of youth
- Showcase the talents of the youth well beyond the walls of ELPC
- Ensure safe and appropriate practice space within ELPC, multiple nights of the week and Saturdays

Linda retired from Hope Academy on September 30, 2024. She plans to pursue other interests and spend more time with her family.

Celebrating 25 Years of Hope Academy

ELPC history shows that in 1999, under the leadership of Dr. J. Richard Szeremany, Director of Music, the Hope Academy of Music and the Arts of ELPC was birthed. Dr. Szeremany was a strong believer in the importance of music and art education for all children and youth. He observed that such programming was being reduced, if not eliminated from public schools. And so, via his leadership and that of ELPC staff and congregation, including the Rev. Dr. Patrice Fowler-Searcy and then Director of Christian Education Judy Menk, the program was organized and has flourished for 25 years.

Highlights of Hope Academy's history include:

- A highly active program of private and group lessons—including piano, violin, guitar; and in dance for ballet, tap, hip hop; and African drumming
- Financial support from leading Pittsburgh foundations—such as the Heinz, Buhl, and Grable Foundations—as well as some corporate funding
- Evolution of HAT co (Hope Academy's Theater Company), which offered performance opportunities for students and also led to multi-year participation in Pittsburgh's Shakespeare Festival. There top awards were won by Hope Academy participants for their delivery of various Shakespearian monologues.
- Development of partnerships/relationships with Pittsburgh Ballet, Shena Simmons Dance Group, and other arts groups to ensure excellent instruction
- Enrollment as many as 350 children per week who attended programs
- Increased financial support by ELPC during more recent years as other funding sources have diminished

The future of Hope Academy is uncertain at this time. Funding has not been identified past the end of 2024. A review will be conducted of the current environment of music and arts education in this region, as well as possible new funding sources, and a recommendation on program's future will be presented.

Let us celebrate loudly the success of Hope Academy and its 25 years of service!

October 6: American Guns are Fueling Mexico's Supply of Illegal Drugs to the U.S. In this video, investigative reporter Mariana van Zeller uncovers the supply chain of American guns being smuggled into the hands of drug cartels, fueling the massive gun violence in Mexico, as they supply the U.S. with illegal drugs.

October 13: Russia's Persecution of Ukrainian Christians

Independent Ukraine has enjoyed a robust tradition of religious freedom, with a variety of faiths and many Christian denominations. Unfortunately, Russia has little tolerance for independent belief systems, wanting instead for all churches to be controlled by the Kremlin. Occupying authorities under orders from the Kremlin have been particularly harsh toward Protestant Christians and their institutions, often painting them as agents of the U.S. This video will examine the foundations and history of Ukraine's Christian diversity, and Russia's persecution of Christians in the occupied territories of Ukraine.

October 20: Christian Nationalism | Part 1 of 3

Daniel Aleshire will be with us to explore the relationship of church and state in the American colonies at the beginning of nationhood, and how the church/state issue moved through U.S. history after the Bill of Rights was added to the Constitution.

Daniel Aleshire served 12 years as a seminary professor, was staff of the Association of Theological Schools in the U.S. and Canada in 1990, and served as Executive Director from 1998–2017 (ATS membership includes more than 280 Mainline, Evangelical, Orthodox, and Roman Catholic seminaries and theological schools.) Since retirement from ATS, he has been a member of the Board of Directors at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. His wife, Jo Ellen Aleshire, is a deacon at ELPC.

October 27: Christian Nationalism | Part 2 of 3

Daniel Aleshire will be with us to explore ways to define Christian nationalism and the findings of three significant sociology of religion studies about this political movement: A 2022 study by the Pew Research Center; a 2023 study by Public Religion Research Institute and the Brookings Institution, and 2022 study The Flag and the Cross: White Christian Nationalism and the Threat to American Democracy by Philip Gorsky and Samuel L. Perry.

In this understanding, humans are tenants on the land; put there "to work for" and "to serve" the land. We have much to atone for as we survey the Hebrew Bible's complex message about land and reflect on our own US history of separating Indigenous peoples from their land. For millennia, oppressors have claimed their violent conquests were ordained by God and taken land from Indigenous people,


