

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



Candle Lighting Liturgy

Candle #1 For those who have died this year

We light this first candle to remember the people in our lives who died this past year, whose presence we ache for, whose spirit we are missing, whose absence we grieve.

Unison response: God, we ache.

Candle #2 Honoring the pain of losses

We light this second candle to represent the wide range of losses we and others in our lives are grieving right now, broken relationships, the loss of health, jobs, faith that used to be certain, and dreams that were shattered.

Unison response: God, we are grieving.

Candle #3 To honor ourselves, our souls, what we're feeling and experiencing

We light this third candle for our weary souls; for the burdens we are carrying, for heavy hearts.

Unison response: God, we long for light.

Candle #4 A desire for hope and peace

We light this fourth candle as a symbol of our desire for hope and peace in this season, to remember that amidst the darkness, light and love can seep in.

Unison response: God, we are open.



Silent and Spoken Prayers

Please feel free to add your spoken petitions.

A note about praying for others out loud: Some people are comfortable with having their prayer concerns lifted up in public worship. Others are not. Before you share aloud any prayer concerns, please be sure that you are not breaking confidentialities.

Whether or not you say the person's name out loud, God hears and receives the intentions of your heart.


Prayer over the Anointing Oil (in unison)


The Rev. BJ Woodworth is Minister of Taizé Prayer here at ELPC.

The Renaissance City Choir will present A Very Ruby Holiday in concert on Saturday, Dec 7 at 7 pm at ELPC! From your favorite


