## **Prelude/Sermon Hymn** – *In Christ There Is No East or West*

Harry T. Burleigh (1866-1949) adapted the tune MCKEE in 1940 for use with the text *In Christ There Is No East or West.* He named it for Rev. Elmer McKee, rector of St. George's Church in New York City, where Burleigh was baritone soloist for 52 years. The first prelude is a fanfare based on this hymn tune.

#### **Special Music** – If I Can Help Somebody

On Feb. 4, 1968, two months before he was assassinated, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. gave a sermon called, *The Drum Major Instinct*. In it, he imagined his own funeral and said he wanted to be remembered for serving others, not for his fame or his many accomplishments. He ended the sermon by quoting from *If I Can Help Somebody*. Dr. King first heard this song in Denver in 1956 and later encouraged Mahalia Jackson to record it, which she did in 1963. https://youtu.be/okzmXyoSKeg?si=kIjzWE216mRiUnUG

## **Recessional Hymn** – We Shall Overcome

We Shall Overcome is recognized as the unofficial anthem of the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s. It was popular with folk singers, including Pete Seeger. Joan Baez led a crowd of 300,000 in singing We Shall Overcome at the Lincoln Memorial in August 1963. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. recited the words to the hymn at Washington National Cathedral on Sunday, March 31, 1968 during his final Sunday sermon before being assassinated days later on April 4. It was sung the following week by over 50,000 people at the end of Dr. King's funeral on April 9, 1968.

# Postlude - Improvisation on We Shall Overcome

Dr. Carl T. Haywood (b. 1949), a native of Portsmouth, Virginia, was director of choral activities at Norfolk State University and organist/choir director at Grace Episcopal Church in Norfolk. *Improvisation on We Shall Overcome* was composed in 2012 for an MLK Service at St. James's Church, Richmond, Virginia.
