

Black History Month

The first celebration of Black History Month took place at Kent State University from January 2 to February 28, 1970. President Gerald Ford recognized Black History Month in 1976. In a message on February 10, 1976, he urged Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

Notes on this morning's music...

Prelude

Frederick Douglass (1818–1895) describes spirituals as "those simple and apparently incoherent songs" with "strong, long and profound accents" that "breathed the prayers and complaint of souls suffering the most cruel anguish. Each voice was a witness against slavery and a prayer that God would deliver us from our chains. . . I often found myself in tears listening to them." – Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass: An American Slave (1845)

Sermon Hymn

The first published version of the African American Spiritual *Keep Your Lamps Trimmed and Burning* was in 1867. The spiritual was popularized by the Jubilee Singers of Fisk University in their fund-raising concerts throughout Europe in the late 19th century.

Offertory

Charles Albert Tindley (1851-1933) was Methodist minister and composer whose father was a slave, but mother was free. Tindley was pastor of Tindley Temple United Methodist Church in Southwest Center City Philadelphia. Dr. Barbara Wesley Baker arranged Tindley's hymn *The Storm Is Passing Over* for SATB choir and piano. An active composer, conductor, and clinician, she was for many years choral director at Eleanor Roosevelt High School in Greenbelt, Maryland.

Postlude

Siyahamba is a South African freedom song. The freedom songs give voice to protest, struggle, and solidarity. Swedish composer Anders Nyberg (b. 1955) helped introduce these freedom songs to the west after taking his choir to South African in the 1970s. This eventually led to the publication of Nyberg's collection Freedom Is Coming: Songs of Protest and Praise from South Africa (1984). Since then, several of the songs have found their way into hymnals, including our Glory to God Hymnal. Siyahamba is #853 in Glory to God and other freedom songs included in the hymnal include #359 – Freedom Is Coming and #746 – Thuma Mina.
