

Black History Month

The first celebration of Black History Month took place at Kent State University from January 2 to February 28, 1970. President Gerald Ford recognized Black History Month in 1976. In a message on February 10, 1976, he urged Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

Notes on this morning's music...

Processional Hymn

I'm Gonna Live So God Can Use Me was first published in *The Negro Sings a New Heaven* in 1930. The arrangement of the hymn in our hymnal is by Wendell P. Whalum, (1931-1987), a leading scholar in black hymnody and spirituals. He was the choral director for the world premiere of Scott Joplin's *Treemonisha* in 1972.

Special Music

Jessie Montgomery (b. 1981) was raised in Manhattan's Lower East Side and began her violin studies at The Third Street Music School Settlement. She received her bachelor's degree in violin performance from the Juilliard School and a master's degree in composition for film and media from New York University. Montgomery's arrangement of the spiritual *I Want to Go Home* was first composed in 2015 and revised in 2021 as part of her *Five Freedom Songs*.

From the composer: *I Want to Go Home* originates from the Southeastern slave states. My setting is inspired by the simple way it was transcribed as a simple seven-note melody without an indicated rhythm, which inspired me to write it in a hybrid Gregorian chant/spiritual style.

I Want to Go Home was recorded in the ELPC Chapel by Anquenique Kinsel and the Kassia Ensemble for an online concert in May 2021 during the COVID pandemic.

Offertory

Rollo Dilworth (b. 1970) was born in St. Louis, Missouri and studied at Case Western Reserve in Cleveland, Ohio and the University of Missouri-St. Louis, and Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. Since 2009 Dr. Dilworth has been a faculty member in the Boyer College of Music and Dance at Temple University in Philadelphia, Pennsvylvania. *Invocation* is an original piece composed in 2015 with words by Dilworth.

Recessional Hymn

Lord, Make Us More Holy was first published in Slave Songs of the United States in 1867. In this collection the spiritual is identified as coming from Charleston, South Carolina.

Postlude

Florence Beatrice Price (1887-1953) was born in Little Rock, Arkansas and graduated from the New England Conservatory of Music in 1906. She was the first African-American woman composer to have a composition performed by a major symphony orchestra. Her *Symphony No. 1 in E Minor* was first performed by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in 1933.
