

Sunday, 23 February 2025 – Seventh Sunday after Epiphany

Psalter

In Colossians 3:16 Paul tells us to

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God."

The psalms are meant to be sung. Singing the psalms is one of the richest treasures of both Jewish and Christian worship. The Reformation brought about a renewed interest in, and appreciation for, the singing of psalms, which played an important role in the formation of Reformed Christians. With this being the 500th anniversary of the start of the Protestant Reformation, here is what Martin Luther said of the Psalms:

"The psalter ought to be a precious and beloved book, if for no other reason than this: it promises Christ's death and Resurrection so clearly--and pictures His kingdom and the conditions and nature of all Christendom--that it might well be called a little Bible."

Early in the 20th century, there was resurgence in metrical Psalmody with the publication of a Psalter by the American Presbyterians in 1912. Metrical Psalmody is when the psalm text is set to music similar to a hymn tune. By mid-20th century the tradition of singing psalms had once again waned, when Psalms were included in worship more as responsive readings than as sung settings. The tradition of singing the psalms in the Presbyterian Church was once again revived with the publication of a new Presbyterian Psalter in 1993.

Recessional Hymn

Lift Every Voice and Sing – often called The Black National Anthem – was written as a poem by NAACP leader James Weldon Johnson . It was first performed in public in Johnson's hometown of Jacksonville, Florida as part of a celebration of Abraham Lincoln's Birthday on February 12, 1900 by 500 schoolchildren at the segregated Stanton School, where James Weldon Johnson was principal. Johnson's brother, John Rosamond Johnson, later set the poem to music. In 1919, the NAACP adopted and labeled the song as The Negro National Anthem.

Postlude

A native Baltimorean, W. Patrick Alston teaches keyboard and international baccalaureate music theory at Baltimore City College High School. He also teaches The Gospel Music Tradition of Baltimore at the Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University as an adjunct professor. He has served as organist, pianist, and music administrator for various churches in Baltimore City and has been active in church music for 30 years. He currently serves as the worship music consultant for New Shiloh Baptist Church.



Member Michael Hellman is being presented with the Allies for Health + Wellbeing's annual Kerry Stoner Award for his work with people living with or at risk of HIV/AIDS.

Stoner was one of the founders of the Pittsburgh AIDS Task Force and died of complications of AIDS in 1993. The Kerry Stoner Award is presented annually by Allies for Health + Wellbeing to someone who has shown commitment to Stoner's legacy and vision.

Protect Anti-Hunger Programs

Congressional leaders and the current administration are proposing extreme cuts to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) that could result in millions of people not being able to access the healthy food they need to survive.

The Republican Study Committee's proposal calls for a 22% cut in SNAP by rescinding the most recent modest update of the Thrifty Food Plan—the program used to determine SNAP benefit amounts—and would take food away from 41 million people per year. This year, the SNAP benefit averages only \$6.20 per person per day. That's what they want to slash.
