This morning is the first Sunday of the season of Lent, a period of 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter. The six Sundays in Lent are not counted in the 40 days. To read more about the season of Lent:

Prelude

Gerald Near (b. 1942) is a graduate of the University of Michigan, he has held various church positions and is currently a freelance composer and music publisher. *O Maker of the World* is attributed to Pope St. Gregory the Great (540-604). Gregory the Great is depicted in the stained glass window above the organ façade on the west side of the chancel.

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) was a leading English composer whose music was often influenced by folk music and songs. His prelude on the hymn tune *Rhosymedre* is from a set of three preludes for organ on Welsh hymn tunes.

Special Music

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791) composed his first string duo in 1783. This is the first of two duos that Mozart wrote to complete a set of six duos by Michael Haydn for the Archbishop Colloredo. The set of six duos was presented to the Archbishop as having all been composed by Haydn. The Archbishop was unable to "detect in them Mozart's obvious workmanship."

Offertory

The text of *Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days* was written by Claudia Frances (Ibotson) Hernaman (1838-1898) and first published in *The Child's Book of Praise* (London, 1873). She wrote over 150 hymns, many of which are for children. The text is set to an original melody by Linda Shute in the offertory anthem. It is more commonly sung to the tune ST. FLAVIAN, as it is in our *Glory to God* hymnal, #166.

Postlude

Fanny Mendelssohn Hensel (1805-1847) was the eldest sister of composer Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy. The siblings shared the same music teacher and Felix said that his sister was a better pianist than he was. Fanny married the Prussian court painter William Hensel in 1829. She wrote over 500 compositions. Her death in May 1847 greatly contributed to her brother's death in November of that year.


